The students watch the Predator and Prey documentary prior to the session and then there is a discussion with the 1-2 guest speakers who have lived experience with addiction. <p>Munson</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Manistee, Kalkaska and Frankfort hospitals have all launched with their Narcan distribution programs in their Emergency Departments (ED), they will provide naloxone in the ED to people who have or are at risk of overdose. <p>There is a grant opportunity coming up through Impact 100. 4:40pm	Current Drug Trends	<p>Kip Belcher, from the Michigan State Police, will provide an update on the current drug use trends</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Kip oversees three teams in Northern Michigan: TNT, SANE, AND HUNT.• Meth, heroin, oversee shipments of narcotics, and opioids are their focuses.• They take a three prong approach and become involved with treatment and mental health organizations as well as teaching of law enforcement and civilians on drug trends, behavioral issues, safety issues with neighbors, workplace safety, etc.• The commonality of finding loaded firearms or weapons with drugs is becoming a real concern for his team.• For the past 12-18 months, they have been seeing crystal meth being routed through Mexico along the same transit lines as heroin and fentanyl.• These drug trends shift regularly• Drug trends start on the West Coast and move east, so in Michigan we are a couple of years behind the West Coast trends.• According to TNT commander, this past year their percentage of drug seizures have been 30% methamphetamine, 17% RX drugs (primarily opioids), and 15% combination of heroin and fentanyl.• They are seeing international mail shipments from Germany, India, China, Singapore, and more, they make it through security and then they make it to Michigan for sales.• Confiscated substances are taken to an incinerator in Grand Rapids.• They are seeing that people with SUD are starting to use meth because they think there is less risk involved, so there has been a shift in drug preference in active	Kip Belcher
